"Me, too," added Rainbow Dash. "I wouldn't change a thing."




"If we pay perfect attention to the script, our play will also be perfect!" Cotton Candy said. She didn't realize that the other ponies' suggestions might make the play even better.

"Thanks to wonderful friends!" said Cotton Candy.







